## **Next Guest Speaker TUESDAY. JUNE 08th**



RICHARD SAUVÉ, Ph.D, P.Eng Director (retired) - Reactor Engineering Group, ATOMIC ENERGY OF CANADA LTD.

"Canadian Nuclear Experience: A Career Perspective".

### **Meeting Highlights:**

- President Ted Abbot called the meeting to order; followed by a group singing of "O Canada".
- He questioned the group to see who was interested in attending the luncheon after the meeting at Hobart's Steakhouse which is located in the Kent Street mall.
- Dennis Eaton introduced our guest speaker for the morning, John Boyko:
  - Globe and Mail has called John a distinguished scholar of Canadian History and praised by the Winnipeg Free Press for his encyclopedic knowledge of Canadian History;
  - grew up in Peterborough and attended Crestwood Secondary School but now lives in Lakefield and is the former Dean of History and now an administrator at the Lakefield College;
  - Was elected Deputy Reeve of Lakefield, member of Peterborough County Council, and served on a number of boards including Children's Aid and the Police Board.
- John's presentation was based on his most recent book "Blood and Daring: How Canada Fought The American Civil War and Forged A Nation"; and here is a brief outline of that presentation:
  - Without the aid of slides to view or written notes to follow, he presented his vast knowledge of our Canadian History events. He presented a brief entertaining outline of these events that allowed the members to follow along throughout his whole presentation.
  - o He opened his presentation by stating that he enjoys travelling around to different parts of country and talking to people who read books, especially ones that pertain to historical events;
  - o he started by reading the first paragraph from his book "The Whispering Ghosts";
  - o talked about John A. MacDonald and how he has been given the title of "The Savior of Canada" in our earlier history era;
  - o the slave immigration from United States to Canada, and how well they settled in to our cultures and evolved, and how their process was not well received by the States as a whole;
  - o the War of 1812 and the native nation involvement, especially mentioning a Shawnee Chief named "Tecumseh";
  - about how 40,000 Canadians living in the States at that time, signed up and fought long side the American armed forces;
  - o a Canadian rebel group, who called themselves the "Copperheads", that caused havoc for the American forces;
  - o elaborated on the involvement of six fascinating people, along with their beliefs, struggles and dreams during that time frame:
    - John Anderson, William Seward (US), Sarah Emma Edwards, Jacob Thompson, George Brown, and two other individuals that towered well over all of them, Abraham Lincoln (US) and John A. MacDonald.
  - He concluded his presentation by stating; "That despite the numerous effects of America's wartime leaders, Canada's action during and after the conflict time frame, kept Canada from becoming part of and being controlled by the United States.










# " WHO AM I " - MEMBERS OF THE MONTH
