Meeting Highlights :

- Due to President Max Radiff's absence, Vice President Ted Abbot called the meeting to order; followed by a group singing of "O Canada".
- He then questioned the group to see who was interested in attending the luncheon after the meeting at Hobart's Steakhouse which is located in the Kent Place Mall on Kent Street West (23 attended).
- Next he reminded the membership that October's meeting is our Annual General Meeting, at which a free lunch will be provided for our members and guests will be charged a fee of \$10.
- Next Ted called upon member Dennis Eaton to come forward and introduce our guest speaker Sandra Joyce :
 - a native Torontonion and a graduate of Ryerson University's Journalism degree program;
 - she has been :
 - publicist for CBS Records Canada;
 - manager of rock bands;
 - contract negotiator for the German Department of Defense;
 - a free-lance sports writer; and
 - consultant at an independent music company;
 - currently Sandra is an English teacher and storyteller in Toronto and working on her second novel;
 - she is also Vice-President of Media for the Terry Fox Beaches Run.

- Her Presentation was titled : **"The Street Arab – The Story of a British Home Child"** and below is a brief outline that she provided to me :

- Over a period of 80 years, from just after Canadian Confederation in 1869 to the beginning of the Second World War, as estimated 120,000 children were sent from the UK to Canada to work as indentured farm workers and labourers. These "British Home Children" were sent by at least 55 childcare organizations in the UK to distribution houses located in different parts of Canada. From there, within a few days, the children were either picked up by the farmers or were sent on the last leg of their journeys by train, sometimes with just a cardboard sign around their necks to identify them. Siblings sent over by the same organizations were separated, sometimes never to see each other again. At times, these children were treated fairly and were even accepted as members of the family they were sent to. More often than not, these children were subjected to physical and verbal abuse. There were no systems set in place to make sure that these "Street Arabs", as they were often called, were being taken care of properly. Some of the larger organizations sent supervisors to check on conditions once a year but their visits were often foiled by inclement weather and lack of travelable roads. Even when they did arrive, they would often only interview the farmers, as the boys were out working at that time. The charitable organizations in the UK were often run by philanthropists who believed that the children would have better and healthier lifestyles, working and living on a farm in Canada – giving them a fresh start in a new country. Yet eugenics – the belief that one's genetic makeup determined intelligence and mental ability, was running rampant at the time, even in Canada. These children, who were often just the victims of

Circumstance (over 70 percent had one parent still alive) were shunned. Parents of Canadians were afraid that they would sully their bloodlines. The reason for writing "The Street Arab – The Story of a British Home Child" was to further expose the story of one of the best kept secrets in Canadian history. The Children, like her own father, kept quiet about their background, as they had been made to feel shame of their humble beginnings.

This piece of historical fiction was written in this format to ensure that all Canadians, regardless of their heritage, could be reached. This was one of the most important influx of immigrants in Canadian history, at a time when the population of Canada was much lower than now.

It estimated that currently one in ten Canadians is a descendant of these children. That would be 3.5 million people. **Her final statement : "These children were truly the builders of our Nation".**




