Meeting Highlights

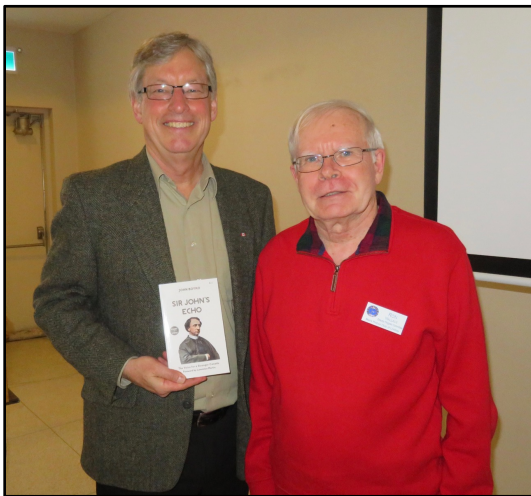
Opening and Announcements:

Guest Speaker: John Boyko



Ron Wallace was asked to introduce the guest speaker John Boyko. The members were informed that John is an author and historian whom the *Globe and Mail* deemed “a distinguished scholar of Canadian political history.” The *Winnipeg Free Press* has praised his “encyclopedia knowledge of Canadian history.” John is the best-selling author of seven books addressing Canadian history and politics. He is now the administrator of Lakefield College School and lives with his wife in Lakefield.

According to John, half of Canadians see Sir John A. MacDonald as a hero. But the other half of the country see him as a villain. He said that during this presentation, he will argue that Sir John should be viewed as a hero to this country. Sir John A. MacDonald was viewed as a villain for a number of reasons. In building the railway across the country, he misused his position as prime minister to garner financial favours to support his re-election campaign. He also maliciously exploited Chinese workers who were building the railway and ensured that they didn't remain in Canada. He also exploited indigenous peoples by taking their lands for the railway. He deliberately starved the native people to force them to move off lands needed for the building of the railway. He also set up residential schools to destroy the native culture. Many native children were physically and sexually abused in these schools.

Sir John A. MacDonald should be viewed as a hero because he was the driving force behind Confederation. As a lawyer, he literally wrote many sections of the Constitution in a way that would be acceptable to others, and remains today. In 1864, Britain wanted to get rid of the colony we call Canada. They were unwilling to support the colony financially, economically or militarily. The Americans wanted to invade Canada as part of their ‘Manifest Destiny.’ Britain decided to give the colony to the Americans. To prevent the Americans from taking over Canada, Sir John A. MacDonald created a Constitution and made Canada a country. He gave the most important and essential powers to the Federal government. He also built the country's infrastructure including the railway. Lastly, he set up trade tariffs to encourage Canadian industry to thrive. John Boyko concluded that Sir John A. MacDonald created, built and saved Canada and should be viewed as a hero.

Closing: President Bert Blackwood concluded the meeting with a humorous story about why you should not compete with current politicians to be the best liar.
